
Over the years we have also been community minded (to a point) with organizing events such as rodeos, supporting the Cancer Society, delivery of magazines to the different care homes and participating in the May Day Parade. Back in the 40's up to the 70's members would don their uniforms (white shirt, black tie, black pants and black socks and shoes and no helmet when the club drill team, performing their maneuvers, would lead the parade through the route set by the May Day Parade committee.

Technically the club was not supposed to be in front of the armed forces but we were there for crowd control and to let the spectators know that the parade was on it's way. This carried on through the decades but at some unknown (or at least I can't remember) time the club was not contacted and asked to lead.

In the early 2000's it was decided that the club should enter a float in the parade. Arrangements were made for a truck and driver with a flatbed and a committee was formed to clean and decorate it. Members were asked to "ride along" with a few trials riders performing by riding up and over the logs that were placed on the

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flatbed. A few of the younger riders were also included with Dads riding along or walking beside them. A highlight in later years was a club member jumping over a Blast From the Past 2, 5 "celebrity" lying in the street. It was a big hit with the numerous spectators and in some Who Was Joe Brown 4 years the club took top awards. The picture above was taken in 2013 (photographer

unknown although it may have been **Loraine Fracy**). Many of the riders as well as the younger ones are still involved in club activities.

With the pandemic raging and everything shutting down, the parade did not run but this year it will go ahead. Always a crowd pleaser, let's hope the VMC volunteers lead by **Rick Kool** will,

once again, keep this new tradition alive.

n March 31st the tumbler lock on the Cycle Park gate was changed to a keyed lock. The keys are special in that they can't be reproduced and, up to this writing, over 200 had been sold to members only. This was to be a temporary solution to non-members using our property until the electric gate was installed. Those members who had purchased a key could then exchange them for an electronic fob.

Is this temporary solution affective to keeping the non-members from riding without permission at Cycle Park? The only way it would work is when the gate was unlocked and the member entered, that member turned around and locked it immediately. This would ensure that only members with keys could access the property. It may seem like a bit of a hassle but all members should accept the responsibility of who can enter. One of the <u>main reasons</u> for all this is:- it's an "insurance liability issue."

WHO WAS JOE BROWN? By Roger Boothroyd



Joe Brown (RIP) was a member of the Victoria Motorcycle Club having joined in January 1951 after his release from the Canadian Air Force. Upon his return to Victoria, he bought a Matchless G45, travelled back to Ontario to road race and sold the bike while there.

Joe rode a variety of motorcycles from Triumph to BSA, Velocette scrambler, Husquvarna, Yamaha, Can-Am, to name a few. He gained his Expert status in scrambles by winning the Novice Scramble in 1959. The All Day Enduro was next with a win in 1961 and 1969. The Men's Activity Award was given to Joe in 1963.

Joe's VMC race number was #23 and in 1966, **Joe** placed third in the CKDA Good Samaritan Scramble. In 1967 he placed third in the Saanich Motocross.

Reliability Trials were also enjoyable for **Joe** as he attained his Expert status in 1969 by winning the Wellburn Trial. In 1970, he was second place in the Brentwood Reliability Trial and in 1980 **Joe** and fellow member **Stu Timbres** were third place in the Team Trial.


Road rides were also a favourite of **Joe's** and in 1979, with wife **Carol**, he won the Nuts in May Road Ride. In the late 50's and into the 60's, **Joe** worked as a mechanic at Brooklands Motorcycle Sales. He then purchased Les Blows Motorcycle Sales from former member **Neil Laing**.

During the years of ownership, he moved the shop several times. His last move was to the strip mall across the Six Mile Bridge. Les Blow's Motorcycles sold many bikes and one year they had one of the highest sales of Yamaha trials bikes in Canada winning him and his wife **Carol** a trip to Japan and the Yamaha factory. He was also a sponsor for **Steve Fracy's** quest for the Canadian Trials Championship

With the downturn in motorcycle sales, **Joe** had to sell Les Blow's Motorcycles to SG Power Products who promised to keep him employed for a year. At the end of that year, the shop was amalgamated with the down town store and Les Blows was no more.

Joe and his family enjoyed many happy weekends camping with other VMC members at Burnt Bridge, Wild Deer Lake and other areas.

Joe managed to secure a position at the University of Victoria as a custodian and stayed there for many years. Sadly, **Joe** passed away in the fall of 1998 of cancer.



Originally called the Border Trial, it was renamed the Joe Brown Trial in 1999. In 2002, life member **Howie Sadler (RIP)** donated the perpetual trophy to replace the missing trophy. In 2012, the Joe Brown Trial was combined with the Major Trial.

JOE BROWN MAJOR TRIAL - BY ROGER BOOTHROYD

Thirty-four riders signed up on April 30th for the annual Joe Brown Major Trial held at Cycle Park, the club's property on Happy Valley Road in Victoria. Using a loop around the circumference of the property, ten sections were laid out with varying degrees of difficulty for the seven classes. All riders were to



ride three loops except for the junior and clubman classes. They could ride two or three and use the best of two for their final score.

After the rider's meeting given by **Steve Fracy** and **Dave Fair** they were on their way to the first section. Some riders by-passed the first to start on the second to help stop any bunch up of riders at anyone section. They would then ride #1 section on the way back to the

n the Beginners class, there were only three and the full names and scores were not recorded. A participation award was given to each.

There must have been too many other things going on in town as there was only one rider in the Junior class. Riding a Gas Gas, **Cecelia Olsen** finished the event with 73 points. Sadly for the VMC, **Cecelia**, her family, **Rachel** and **Loren**, will be leaving Victoria and settling back east. All have been big supporters and volunteers for the club and we'll miss them.

Only three riders entered the Intermediate class and all finished within a 10 point spread. In first place was **Cole Latiff** on Gas Gas with 29 points. Second, also on Gas Gas, was **Aaron Grant** finishing with 33 points. Third place went to **Jake Eastman** on a Scorpa with 39 points.

In one of the largest classes of the day, the Senior Intermediate, **Dave Fair** on a Vertigo was the one to beat as he placed first with 6 points and 24 cleans. A first loop disaster for second place **Dave Carlson** had him tied on cleans with **Fair** but a final score of 13 points. Third place went to **Beta** mounted **Dave Hillman** with 20 points. **Hillman** was tied in points with fourth and fifth place but took third with 19 cleans.

The other class with eight riders was the Sportsman and **Connor Lund** on a Gas Gas led from the start. He finished the three loops with 17 points. **Riley Ferguson** on Vertigo had a poor second round but managed to place second with 25 points. Not far behind **Ferguson** was another Vertigo rider, **Blake Fontaine** who finished the event with 27 points.

The Senior Sportsman class could only entice one rider, **Mike Graham** on a Vertigo. He finished with 37 points.

VMC Champion **Thomas Cordner** on Vertigo had a low score in all three loops ending in first place with 18 points. Second place went to another Vertigo rider, **Jeremy McChesney**, who doubled **Cordner's** score and finished with 36 points. Also on a Vertigo, **Andrew Watson**, placed third with 42 points.

The Clubman class had five entries and leading from the start on a Gas Gas was **Cam Woodsend**. Riders could ride two or three loops and use the best of two. **Woodsend** finished the event with 3 points. Second was **Graham Twiggs** on a Vertigo. **Twiggs** used the first and third loop and ended with 39 points. In third place using the first two loops was **Colin Newberry** on a Montesa. **Newberry** had 48 points.

VINTAGE SPEAKING

A Brief History of the Marque Paton

Manufactured: 1957-1976 (or later)

ITALIAN MOTORCYCLES



Commencing in 1958, Giuseppe Pattoni, his

brother Giuseppe and designer Lino Tonti produced motorcycles of 125 and 175cc. That year a machine sporting their <u>DOHC</u> 125ccc engine finished in 7th place at the IOM TT, ridden by Mike Hailwood. Giuseppe had previously been chief mechanic of the FB Mondial team, and Tonti is perhaps best known for the frame he designed for Moto Guzzi. Tonti left Paton shortly after the first success.

In 1964, using components from the 125, Paton produced a 247cc twincylinder motorcycle developing 32 hp at 11500 rpm. Alberto Pagani took 3rd at the

1964 TT on this machine. In 1966 a 500cc twin of 52 HP distinguished itself.

During the 1960s they built around ten racing motorcycles which competed in some 150 events. 1976 saw the advent of a remarkable two-stroke transverse V-Four, with the two central cylinders facing rear and the outer two inclined forwards. The 492.6cc engine is water-cooled with a six-speed gearbox and develops 95 hp at 11300 rpm. The frame too is innovative.

The firm began building replicas of their earlier machine for competitors in classic racing, and also built road-going TT style motorcycles using Kawasaki engines designated S1 Strada.

Paton returned to GP racing in the years 2000 and 2001, in the 500 class. In the same period they introduced their PG500R, a 500cc 70° V4 two-stroke capable of speeds in excess of 340 km/h.

In 2016 the company was bought by Advanced Group S.r.l.

DAVE RHODES OPINION

ave Rhodes, a "senior" Welshman, has been involved with Trials from his early days of his youth in Wales. He is the owner of Outlaw Trialsport in Vernon and was inducted into the Canadian Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 2018 along with the **Shanks** family from the VMC. His involvement with Trials is well known throughout the western provinces and Canada, and for his organization of the 1975 FIM trial at Bragg Creek, Alberta. Quote - I heard "I'm so old I can remember when World Trials was interesting."

Yes I know some new to Trials, might be confused if they click onto the videos showing what the Euros call Xtrials - they even refer Dave Rhodes, Steve Baker, Bob Work (RIP) to the events being a "Race" - No wonder they often fast forward to another sport. with words like

"I that" can't do As many old timers will remember - Trials events were invented at the turn of the Century in Jolly old England, with long distance courses. - riders usually started at one minute intervals and followed a pre - marked loop over rough back roads which had numerous big hill climbs, - riders lost points on these natural obstacles, and at the end of the day the rider with the lowest score was the winner. (remember these were all rigid frame bikes back then)

While we won't go into too much detail from the prewar events - after the second world war - Trials once again were the most popular sport, as riders used their every day transport to compete at the weekends. (most events close

Most Trials in the UK started from a Pub yard - and again riders were dispatched at one minute intervals, - the loops at that time were all around 70-100 miles, with approx. 30-40 observed sections. - The course consisted of ordinary Country roads, with detours through farm land and moorland crossings, which all featured a variety of Observed sections, with muddy gullies being a favorite. All the riders rode the same loop and the same sections. (This is still how it is at the Scottish Six Days) Continued Page 7

A time limit was imposed, plus usually a couple of special tests to act as tie breakers. The long course helped to thin out the riders and avoid too many delays. - The events were very much an individual sport, and often you would not see many riders along the way - no big backlogs at sections etc.

After clocking off back at the finish, many would stop in the pub for a pint and a chat, before heading home, with no idea who had won - you saw the results in the newspaper the following week, but also received a copy in the mail, along with any award which you had won.

It is our opinion that Trials run in this fashion were the very best then - and could be the very best now with a bit more effort. (Note: Some UK events still follow this format)

<u>NOTE:-</u> This writer can remember organizing a trial from Cycle Park all the way over to the Sooke Road and back with multiple sections near or within the single track trail. Now-a-days we are lucky to have Cycle Park but limited to using the full area of our club property. **Ed.**

Welcome: The meeting was called to order by the President **Dave Horner** at 7:31 PM.

- 1) Secretary Grant read the minutes of the previous Regular Monthly Meeting of 03/28/22.
- Roger Boothroyd moved the minutes be adopted as read, seconded by Harold Perepalkin. Carried.
- 2) Secretary **Grant** read the minutes of last weeks Executive Meeting of 04/13/23.
- Mike Hornick moved to accept these minutes as read, second by Pete Smither. <u>Carried.</u> Business arising from the Minutes:
- 3) President **Horne**r reviewed the process and majority requirements for approval of the

The **Aprilia RS50** is a <u>sport moped</u> made by <u>Aprilia</u>. The model made until 2005 was powered by a single cylinder <u>two-stroke</u> aluminium cylinder block, liquid cooled 49.7 cc (3.03 cu in) Motori-Minarelli AM6 engine. The new model, made since 2006, uses a single cylinder two-stroke aluminium cylinder block, liquid cooled 49.9 cc (3.05 cu in) engine made by <u>Derbi</u>, the D50B0. The bike is popular in countries that have restrictions on motorcycle engine size at specific ages. In restricted form the RS50 is capable of speeds of 50 km/h (30 mph), as per the laws in many European countries for those aged 16. In derestricted form, the 1997 model was tested at a speed of 105 km/h (65 mph). This and other similar machines such as the <u>Derbi GPR 50</u> and <u>Yamaha</u> TZR50 have also been popular choices as a more adult-sized option for MiniGP racing, which is otherwise more commonly participated in by riders of smaller bikes such as the Honda NSR50.
