

hhh Memories - Mostly good but a few bad!! The pictures above show four of the many perpetual trophies that are no longer awarded. The oldest one on the left is for the Brentwood Reliability Trial later renamed the Brentwood Enduro and was donated by the Brentwood Hotel in 1914. Next to it is the Kirk Reliability Trial, like the Brentwood, had riding sections included in the course. It was donated by the now

defunct Kirk Coal Company in 1930 and, like the Brentwood, later became the Kirk Enduro. It was only after the elimination of the riding sections that the names were changed to enduro. The wood trophy is the Terra Nova Enduro started in 1964 and the last time it ran was 2015. On the far right is the Field Meet trophy but like the other three and a few others, has been relegated to history.

There are varied reasons that the club lacks any cross country events now, not withstanding the land use and insurance issues. In the early days the bikes used in these events were the same bikes used in most events with a few minor changes. Then came the early trials bikes such as Greeves, Cottons and then Bultaco and Montesa, most equipped with an odometer. These were capable of being used for both observed trials or enduros as many of us did. The early enduro bikes were heavy and not really suitable for reliability trials but advancements in the manufacturing of these

bikes led to an increase in sales as they became popular. At the same time trials bikes were having a remake with lighter, water cooled powerful engines and better suspension. Many trials riders didn't want to use these bikes in cross country events but use them only in observed trials. Cross country events started waning when the club had included Brentwood and Kirks in separate VIDRA events. We were also in trouble when we couldn't entice many riders to enter short cross country events at Cycle Park. There was also the problem of lack of volunteers to organize them and the only places to run any of these events was the Tansky property or, as an alternate, the Shawnigan property if we could get permission.

The days of the Geritol I and II groups as well as some others are gone where we would go out and search for and cut new trails or clear old trails and then organize an event. Ahhhh — these were the good memories!!

We realize the "old style" enduro with timed sections is no longer "in vogue" and that the popularity is with the "go fast" type of event but hope sometime in the future, the timed enduro style will, once again, become popular. Now to find some volunteers!!

ur globe trotting member **Rob Beecroft** landed in Venice on May 6th and was able to make his way to the hotel which was 25 minutes away. He says it's an interesting, busy place with maze like streets and is easy to get lost. He had to use Google maps to find the bus station. He did manage to tour around and take some pictures so have included a couple here. **On Day 2** he rides to Pisa from Venice. Venice (/ˈvɛnɪs/ VEH-niss; Italian: Venezia [veˈnɛttsja] (listen); Venetian: Venesia or Venexia [veˈnɛsja] is a city in northeastern Italy and the capital of the Veneto region. It is built on a group of 118 small islands that are separated by canals and linked by over 400 bridges. The islands are in the shallow Venetian Lagoon, an enclosed bay lying between the mouths of the Po and the Piave rivers (more exactly between the Brenta and the Sile). In 2020, around 258,685 people resided in greater Venice or the Comune di Venezia, of whom around 55,000 live in the historical island city of Venice (centro storico) and the rest on the mainland (terraferma). Together with the cities of Padua and Treviso, Venice is included in the Padua-Treviso-Venice Metropolitan Area (PATREVE), which is considered a statistical metropolitan area, with a total population of 2.6 million.

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Day 2 - Pisa Italy

From Venice to Pisa is 335 Kilometres. We had some rain on the way to Pisa. The temp was mainly 19-22C.

However, it did drop to 12C going over a mountain pass. On this leg of the journey we rode the highway where Enzo Ferrari used to test his vehicles and Ferrari test drivers of today still test out new models. From here it's an exciting ride onto Pisa, passing forests and mountains, and reaching up to 1,388 m / 4,554 ft above sea level as we cruise over the Abetone Pass. This evening we visit the magnificent Duomo and, of course, the famous leaning Tower of Pisa, on the Square of Miracles. Heading to Corsica today. It's a 4.5 hour ferry ride.

Day 3—4 - Pisa to Saint Florent Corsica (France)

From Pisa we head south to make our ferry crossing to Corsica, which takes around 4 and a half hours. Upon arrival we traverse some seriously



winding and twisting roads, exposing us to some stunning island scenery and Mediterranean forests. Corsica is


extremely mountainous. We rode some beautiful curvy roads along steep mountain edges. Fortunately, the roads had barriers. We lucked out as the predicted thunderstorm never happened in our area. We overnight in Saint Florent, a quaint port town on Corsica's north coast, nestled between the spectacular mountains of Cap Corse and the untamed Agriates desert.

French 'Corse' (official name 'Collectivité Territoriale de Corse'), is the Mediterranean Sea's fourth-largest island, after Cyprus, Sardinia and Sicily. Approximately $183~\rm km\,/\,114$ mi long from north to south and $83~\rm km\,/\,52$ mi from east to west, Corsica has around $1,000~\rm km\,/\,621$ mi of coastline. Situated $170~\rm km\,/\,106$ mi from mainland France's southeastern coast, it lies $90~\rm km\,/\,56$ mi from northwestern Italy. Formed of ancient



salamander and the Corsican fire salamander.

Home to around 340,000 people, tourism is the main industry due to the island's coastline, climate and mountains. Industrial development is limited and instead there is a focus mainly on food processing, with the island producing sausages, cheeses and wine, plus six official varieties of Corsican honey that are available for sale. While French is the official language, spoken by virtually all Corsicans, most also use the Corsican dialect, Corsu, which is akin to Tuscan.



ing the breathtaking scenery and riding the endless twisties of the incredibly mountainous island of

Corsica. As we make our way north towards Macinaggio, we get to admire a continuous array of striking landscapes, including the scenic Evisa Valley, a long stretch of narrow canyons dramatically carved by the Ruda river, then more stunning coastal terrain around Cap Corse, on our approach to Macinaggio. Ride Distance: 202 km / 126 mi

Located on the northeast coast of Corsica, the small port of Macinaggio has a dramatic history that has been active since ancient times. The Romans used the area as a military port and it was here that Corsican independence leader Pascal Paoli fell to his knees and kissed the ground after his return from exile in England in 1790. A few years later Napolean Bonaparte passed through as well. Trade and fishing have been an important industry in the area, helping the port evolve into the modern marina that exists today.



<u>Day 6</u> Macinaggio to Livorno (Italy)

This morning we make our way to Bastia for our ferry crossing back to Italy, which takes around 4.5



hours. We arrive into the beautiful city of Livorno in time to check into our hotel before dinner. Ride Distance: 43 km / 27 mi. Originally a small fishing village, Livorno is now Tuscany's major port and second largest city. Fortified by the Pisans in the 14th century, Livorno Dourished as a free port from 1675 until it became part of the Kingdom of Italy in 1860. Much of the city has been rebuilt according to its original plan after sustaining sever damage by bombing during World War II.

Travelling south along the ancient Roman road, the Via Cassia, we pass through some beautiful Tuscan terrain as we make our way towards Italy's capital. Our lunch stop today is the stunning hilltop village of

Montalcino, providing more spectacular views of Tuscany before arriving into the historic city of Rome. Ride Distance: 380 km / 236 mi

Known as the 'Urbs Aeterna', or 'Eternal City' (a phrase first penned by the Latin poet Albius Tibullus, c. 55 BCE - 19 BCE),



Rome has always been an important hub that is today a political capital, a religious centre, and a memorial to the creative

imagination of the past. Starting out as a small town on the banks of the Tiber, Rome originally grew in size and strength through trade, as the city's location provided merchants with an easily navigable waterway on which to transport their goods. Though the city owed its prosperity to trade in the early years, it was the Roman warfare which would make it a powerful force in the ancient world.

Day 8

Today we have a full day to explore the mighty city of Rome. Join us on an included walking tour where we visit the magnificent Pantheon, Colosseum, St. Peter's Basilica and muchmore. Tonight we suggest dinner in a restaurant around the Trevi Fountain (the largest and possibly most beautiful fountain in Rome), to take in the charming atmosphere of Piazza di Trevi and Rome.

<u>Day 9</u> Continuing south, we pass through southern Italy's largest city, Naples, and make a stop at the preserved ancient Roman city, Pompeii,

for a guided tour. Leaving Pompeii, we enter the UNESCO listed Amalfi Coast, a landscape of breathtaking coastal scenery and pastel coloured villages. We spend the next two night in the charming town of Sorrento, located on the spectacular Sorrentine

Situated at the southeastern base of Mount Vesuvius, Pompeii was a

Situated at the southeastern base of Mount Vesuvius, Pompen was a large Roman town which was preserved in volcanic ash following the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 CE. Excavated in the 19th - 20th century, Pompeii is one of the richest archaeological sites in the world and offers an important insight into a sophisticated Greco-Roman city that was frozen in time.

<u>Day 10</u> We swap the bikes for a boat today as we explore this stunning region the best way possible - from the water, on an included excursion to the superb Isle of Capri. It was a 20 minute ferry ride from Sorrento. The two main towns, Capri and Anacapri were crowded with tourists. There were lots of restaurants and stores selling tourist merchandise. One church had a beautiful tiled floor. The few roads were very narrow, our little minibus had to backup on sharp corners and swing into the lane of oncoming traffic. The drivers were patient, no honking, so it's a regular occurrence.

The Isle of Capri is composed of a single limestone block measuring around 6.25 km / 3.9 mi in length, with a maximum width of 2.9 km / 1.8 mi and an area of



 $10~\rm sq~km$ / $4~\rm sq~mi$, rising up to $589~\rm m$ / $1,932~\rm ft$ at Monte Solaro in the west. The island's coastline is lined by precipitous cliffs and features two main indentations - Marina Grande on the northern side, which serves as the chief port of the island, and Marina

Piccola on the southern side. Capri hosts the most varied flora in all of Italy and plants like Mediterranean bush, Ilex wood and Euphorbia have been observed here. Numerous fish species like conger eels, groupers, sargo, red goldfish, and mullets are found in the surrounding waters. It is also home to numerous avian species like robins, peregrine falcons,



woodcocks, quails, and blackbirds. Various species of geckos have also been recorded on the island.

<u>Day 11</u> This morning we ride the breathtaking Amalfi Coast, with it's impressive cliffs, spectacular scenery and delightful towns - it is one ride you will never forget! Awesome views of small towns with colourful houses, perched on the cliff face. The road was narrow with lots of traffic. The average speed was only 25-40 km/hour. It's definitely a spot that attracts lots of tourists.

Leaving the west coast behind us, we make our way to the east coast of Italy to catch the overnight ferry from Bari to Durres, Albania. Along the way we pass through the beautiful Dolomiti Lucane Mountains, characterized by dramatic, high peaks that date back 15 million years. Ride Distance: 339 km / 211 mi

<u>Day 12</u> We disembark the ferry and enter Albania, a little known destination filled with mosques, citadels and Ottoman architecture. Our time is short in Albania before we cross into an equally unknown country of Montenegro riding the coastline, stopping en route via the beautiful Budva, the coastline here is stunning as we ride along the shoreline of the wonderful Kotor Bay. We cross into Croatia and continue north with epic views of the Adriatic Sea before topping the day off with an incredible vista of the Dubrovnik Old Town.

A very long day today. We got off the ferry at 8:00 am and reached our hotel at 9:00 pm. We only went around 340 km, but going across 5 border checks was painfully slow. At each we had to produce our passport, driver's license and the registration for our bike. At one crossing the computer





system was down, so we had to wait an hour before the problem was fixed. At other crossings the border police weren't in any hurry to let us through. Probably on their coffee break. Albania, Montenegro and Croatia aren't in the EU, so traffic doesn't flow across easily, as in the rest of Europe.

Montenegro is a incredibly beautiful country. We rode along an ocean road for 150 km or more. It went through many tiny towns, with houses right up to the waterline. The only downside was the speed was only 30-50 km/hour. It was probably the most scenic road I've ever ridden.

<u>Day 13</u> Today, **John Passfield**, my friend from

Rob's Tour Continued the UK and I walked around the upper wall of the old city of Dubrovnik. The walls are

the main reason why Dubrovnik is well known as the Pearl of the Adriatic. The old City of Dubrovnik is completely surrounded with defensive walls and forts, including the Old Port. The walls run uninterrupted for 1940 meters (6365 feet) in length, encircling most of the City, and reach a maximum height of about 25 meters (83 feet). It was built between the 7th and 11th century. Several scenes from the Game of Thrones were filmed there. Afterwards, we took the cable car to the top of Mt. Srd. The view was breathtaking.

Day 14 We are heading back into Montenegro again today. We had a short ride day, so went on a short boat ride out to an island with

a church on it. After returning

from the island we hopped back on the bikes to ride on a serpentine (curvy) road to the top of a mountain. Along the way we stopped and climbed up a very long stairway up to a shrine for an historically important man (Peter II). A mountain lodge will be our overnight stay.

<u>Day 15</u> Two days ago, on our way to Dubrovnik, one of the riders hit his right foot into a small cement block, about 2 ft high. We were being squeezed to the right side of a narrow road to let a bus go by. Unfortunately, he broke is tibia, so is unable to ride his bike. However, he's traveling with the support van driver, so will finish the tour. He said he didn't notice the block until it was too late

to avoid it. Bad luck. Yes, the weather have finally improved. The last several days it had been 25C.

We take the road less travelled once again today, meandering through empty narrow back roads,

witnessing the beautiful country-side of Montenegro and Bosnia-Herzegovina. Our destination this evening is Mostar, famous for its 16th century bridge built by the Ottomans and still bearing the scars from the recent conflict. Ride Distance: 240 km / 149 miles. We spent the evening exploring the old city of Mostar and walking over the famous Mostar bridge several times. Straddling the Neretva River, the bridge known as the "Stari Most" was originally built between 1557 and 1566. It was destroyed in 1993 during the Bosnian War and rebuilt in 2004.

<u>Day 16</u> Our route today starts out following the river towards Konjic and the fascinating Tito's Bunker, riding through magnificent canyons and the spectacular Blidinje National Park. Leaving Bosnia



& Herzegovina behind us, we return to Croatia and ride the stunning Adriatic Coast road to the UNESCO listed town of Trogir, where we spend the next two nights. Ride Distance: 280 km / 174 mi.



Called "Trau" by the Venetians, Trogir is a charming town on the Adriatic Coast. The historic centre is set within medieval walls on a tiny island, connected by bridges to the mainland. Designated a UNESCO heritage site in 1997, the old town contains many perfectly preserved medieval and Renaissance buildings and

is home to a number of key attractions, including The Cathedral of St. Lawrence, a Gothic masterpiece of art.

Today we toured Tito's underground bunker, built to withstand a nuclear blast. Three hundred

and fifty people had supplies to survive 6 months. What would they have found when they came out? The entrance to the bunker was through a carport door, in an



Rob's Tour Continued old house. The bunker was 280 meters under a mountain. It was never used, but fully maintained from 1953


until 1980.

<u>Day 17</u> Today we have an included excursion to the nearby historic town of Split, where we will explore some of Split's most interesting sights by foot. We return to Trogir for one more night.


Croatia's second largest city, Split has a rich history dating back to Roman times. The old town was originally built around the Diocletian's Palace (a fortress-like palace built for the retired Roman emperor Diocletian), where the locals sought refuge many centuries ago. Today Split has around 180,000 inhabitants and is the economic hub of the Eastern Adriatic shoreline.

<u>Day 18</u> As we head north towards the historic town of Poreč, we follow the stunning Adriatic coast, passing through charming coastal villages before

ascending into the spectacular twisties of the Ucka Nature Park. We cross onto the Istria Peninsula to spend our final night in Croatia. Ride Distance: 495 km / 308 mi



ride today through the mountains to reach the town of Bled. The temp was 27C. The roads had good pavement, lots of curves and hairpin



Ride Distance: 266 km / 165 mi

<u>Day 20</u> Our final day on the road provides one of the most scenic days of the entire trip as we explore the incredible beauty of this stunning alpine region.

On our way to the Slovenian capital of Ljubljana, we cross briefly into Austria and enjoy one of the most spectacular sightseeing roads in the region, the Solčava Panoramic Road. Upon arrival in Ljubljana, we return our bikes before arriving at our hotel and enjoying our final night together at our farewell dinner.

Ride Distance: 180 km / 112 mi

I finished the ride safely. The bikes have been returned now. Today's ride was spectacular, as the route took us high in the mountains and the roads were nice and curvy. Slovenia has lots of forests and alpine pastures. It was a beautiful place to ride.

Peter Grant to amend and have updated Aims and Objects posted on website.



A Brief History of the Marque Bluebird Motorcycles

Bluebird was a motorcycle produced circa 1920s.


Post World War I, a revised form of artillery wheel had been patented by John Ireland and a Mr. Johnston. This wheel was for cars but it was not a commercial success. In the early 1920s John Ireland turned his attention to motorcycles and produced some machines in Wolverhampton under the **Bluebird** name. Most were fitted with V-twin JAP engines.




There is an interesting article from an owner of an Australian motorcycle of very similar name, the Blue Bird built by Healings of Victoria who sold the same machines interstate under the Peerless label.

The pictures are taken from the earlymotor.com site which states, "...able to locate the following advertisement in the Geelong Advertiser in 1921... Not only does the advertisement pin down the origin of Blue Bird Cycles, it also identifies Mr. Kinleyside as an agent for JAP motorcycles. Presumably Blue Bird cycles were sourced from Healings, who would also supply a motor cycle from their catalogue should the occasion arise." There was also a Bluebird by Geer of Missouri.
